Since the days of our childhood we have heard the faithful servants of our Lord preach concerning the latter days and how wicked this world would become. Although we heard and believed these things to be true, it seemed then that those

evil days were so far into the future that surely we would not have to concern ourselves with them.

For many of us time has swiftly passed and the days of childhood have become only a memory. Most of those faithful servants, whom we

loved, and whose words we embraced within our hearts, have now been called home one by one. Their pleading and entreating voices are forever silenced on earth but their loving words of warning live on in our hearts. They are not forgotten. Neither have they been diminished. The wicked days foretold are now upon us and growing worse day by day.

Today we recognize, more than ever, that even in our beloved America, this iniquity, which is the lack or absence of righteousness and justice, is multiplying at an alarming rate. The true love for God and fellow man is almost a matter of history. In many cases, our elected leaders defy the word of God, have forsaken the people, and serve only themselves. The evidence of iniquity and ungodliness is obvious in their conduct and in the legislation they prepare. his own spiritual life was a struggle. He had written to them, "Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect." (Philippians 3:12). Paul was pressing forward. He was straining with all of his energy by the power of the Holy Spirit. He did not expect to be carried to heaven on a feather bed. He was warring and agonizing. You beloved, must do the same.

What a grand example of perseverance Paul set for all of us! Nothing enticed him from his steadfastness. "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself" (Acts 20:24). He has entered into his rest, because the Lord his God helped him to maintain his stance to the end. Most earnestly, from the depths of my soul, I implore you with this: "Stand fast in the Lord, my dearly beloved."

Paul urged them to stand fast because of their citizenship: *"For our conversation* (citizenship) *is in heaven"* (Philippians 3:20). If you are in Christ, you are a citizen of the New Jerusalem. Men ought to behave themselves according to their citizenship and not dishonor their country.

When a man was a citizen of ancient Athens, he felt it incumbent upon him to be brave. Xerxes¹ said, "These Athenians are not ruled by kings; how will they fight?" "No, they are not," the reply came, "but every man respects the law, and each man is ready to die for his country."

Xerxes, soon learned that the same obedience and respect of law ruled the Spartans, and that they, because they were of Sparta, were all brave as lions. He sent world to Leonidas², and his little troop to give up their arms. "Come take them" was the courageous reply. The Persian king had myriads of soldiers, while Leonidas had only three hundred Spartans at his side. It cost the Persian despot many thousands of men to force a passage. The sons of Sparta died rather than desert their post. Every citizen of Sparta felt that he must stand fast: it was not for such a man as he to yield.

I like the spirit of Bayard, that sixteenth century French knight who was without fear and without reproach. He did not know what fear meant. In his last battle, his spine was broken, and he said to those around

him, "Place me up against a tree, so that I may sit up and die with my face to the enemy."

Yes, if our backs were broken, if we could no more bear the shield or use the sward, it would be incumbent upon us, as citizens of New Jerusalem, to die with our faces toward the Enemy. We must not yield, we dare not yield, if we are of

"the "city of the great King" (Psalm 48:2).

The martyrs urge us to stand fast; the "cloud of witness" (Hebrews 12:1), bending from their thrones above, beseech us to stand fast; all the shining, heavenly hosts cry to us, "Stand fast!"

Stand fast for God, the truth and holiness, and let no man take your crown!
